• Space journalist Andrew Chaikin's job is to write about events in space that are truly "out of this world."

On Wednesday he shared a few of those tales with students at the Lewis Center for Educational Research.

A favorite was about astronaut Bill Anders' first sight of the moon on Apollo 8, the first manned mission to orbit the moon.

"He could see more stars than he had ever seen before, except this black round shape in the stars, like a hole in the stars," Chaikin said. "Then he realized this hole in the stars was the moon. As they came on it and knew it was big, it was close, and if they were off target they would hit it."

"Anders said it was eerie — the hair on the back of his neck stood up. Then he said to himself, 'Come on, Anders, you're not supposed to feel this way,' and got back to his assigned tasks.





"That, to me, was gold," Chaikin said . "That's what I wanted to say with this book." Chaikin is best known for writing "A Man on the Moon: The Triumphant Story of the Apollo Space Program," about those who made moon missions possible.

Chaikin's visit to the school was part of preparations for the school's participation in NASA's LCROSS mission to the moon. The school will be participating in the mission and Chaikin's role was to motivate the students.

"I've had great questions from these kids," Chaikin said. "It's been great to get them fired up about the opportunities they have to participate in this program."
